

I served on the Schofield from 11/81 to 10/84 as an EW. During my time on the Schofield we did two Wes Pac's which were both a lot of fun. On the first West we did the usual maneuvers patrolling off the coast of Russia getting buzzed by Bear Deltas, followed by Russian Intel ships. However, the ship was plagued with boiler problems that eventually had us stuck in Olongapo for 5 weeks. Damn the luck!!

The second West-Pac was also exciting. On the way to Hawaii from San Diego the ship again had boiler problems that caused us to go DIW. The decision was made to tow us to Pearl for repair. What a repair it was! They did not have an available dry dock for the repair to the boiler, so they put 10,000 pound weights on the starboard side of the ship to list it 30 degrees to allow access to the port side skin that would normally be under the water line. They cut a hole in the port side of her and replaced the super charger that was associated with the boiler make up. We lived on the Schofield while it listed for roughly a month because the base did not have available housing for us. That cruise eventually landed us in the Persian Gulf for a good 4 months. However, the payoff was Perth and Melbourne, Australia. Also Dunedin and Auckland, New Zealand. Damn the luck!! No other ships came with us to New Zealand. We had the towns to ourselves. I believe Captain Perkins had a little more pull than the other commanding officers, and rightfully so; he was a great leader.

Currently I work for Boeing at Edwards A.F.B. on the F-22 fighter as the aircraft operations manager.
